Healthcare Coding



The Healthcare Coding program prepares students to review documentation and create coded data used by medical providers to obtain reimbursement from government programs and insurance companies. Medical coders abstract provider encounters and assist in providing data to public health officials. Instruction includes fundamentals of the profession, utilizing medical record and insurance software, medical terminology, and data classification systems.



Program Outcomes

Healthcare Coding students will earn a 36-hour certificate, or continue on to an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree in preparation to sit for a nationally-recognized exam through the American Academy of Professional Coders or the American Health Information Management Association. Students will learn health information requirements and standards, computer technology, and various reimbursement methodologies.
